PARENT SURVEY RESULTS

It is with great pleasure that I write to report to you on the parent survey that ISM conducted for us last spring. First, let me thank all of you who participated in this survey. Your willingness to share your opinions helps us to identify areas where we are strong and helps us identify areas where we can grow or change in order to improve on our strengths. A total of 129 families responded to the survey; a response rate of 68.6%. According to ISM this is a high response rate giving us a high level of confidence in the validity of the survey.

Let me tell you a little bit about ISM. Independent School Management has been dedicated to the advancement of independent school management for over 36 years. During that time they have worked with and developed surveys for thousands of independent schools. Consequently, they not only offer us the value of an unbiased opinion, but also offer the value of comparing our results to benchmarks that have been developed as a result of their many years of conducting surveys.

I am pleased to share with you that the survey indicated that there is a high level of satisfaction with the teaching, learning and overall programs at Princeton Academy expressed by our community. The survey asked parents to rate programs, procedures, and a variety of other areas of the school on a five point scale, with 5 being the highest level of agreement/satisfaction. ISM considers mean scores in any area between 4 and 5 to indicate a high level of satisfaction, scores between 3.5 and 3.9 are considered acceptable, but merit looking into, and scores below 3.5 indicate areas of concern. I am happy to report that no areas in the survey scored below 3.5. Only our summer and extended day programs, and our use of social media to communicate, scored below 3.9.

We were especially pleased that the results indicated a strong awareness, belief, and confidence in our very specific mission of being a school that understands and engages boys in learning, while instilling a strong sense of values and building character, (a School for Boys in the Sacred Heart Tradition.) Furthermore, we learned that parents highly value and appreciate our committed teachers and academic rigor, leadership and character development, our small classes and school size, and our safe and caring environment. We were also pleased that there was a high level of agreement with the statements "my son is enthusiastic about going to school" and "Princeton Academy is a safe environment in which to make mistakes." We see this every day, and are glad that you, too, are experiencing this.

Not content to rest on these laurels, we dug deeper into the data and were able to identify areas that were perceived as strong, but not as strong as other areas. These areas did not surprise us, as we were making plans to improve them, even before we received the survey results. These areas are: improving our facility, enhancing our integration of

technology, and adding social media to our means of communicating with you about Princeton Academy. With regard to improving our facility, the Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Board has established a Building Project Committee that is working with the administration to plan the renovation of our main school building. Currently, we are in the design development phase of this project, and you will be hearing more about the project as it develops.

In the area of technology integration we have hired a new IT coordinator, updated our wireless connectivity in the school, and begun the implementation of an iPad program in the upper middle grades, as well as in the lower school. It is exciting to see our 7th and 8th graders bringing their iPads to class, and home! At the same time we remain committed to judicious use of laptops throughout our program. One recent example is the 4th grade's use of Khan Academy to enrich and individualize our students' learning of mathematics.

The survey included a purposeful set of questions regarding communication because we recognize the importance of open and frequent communications between parents and school. The results clearly indicated that there is a high level of satisfaction with all of the traditional ways in which we have been communicating with parents. Rest assured we will not cut back on any of these methods. On the other hand, ISM strongly advised us that we need to get our story out beyond our community and so this year we have added a Princeton Academy of the Sacred Heart Facebook page. We will also soon be adding some Twitter accounts to the one already established by our athletic department as well as posting YouTube videos to allow us to show the school in action. It is our hope that many of you will "friend" Princeton Academy on Facebook, and when you like something on our newsfeed, all your Facebook friends will become more aware of the wonderful program for boys we have here at Princeton Academy!

We will be sending out a short follow-up survey soon to get specific feedback from parents as to how we might improve our extended day and summer programs. We would like to see them grow, and look forward to your feedback.

We are proud of our program and faculty, we are proud of and appreciate your support, and we are pleased that the ISM consultant who worked with us said, "I love your little school!" Now, we ask your support as we address the areas that we would like to improve, and, most importantly, we ask your help in spreading the word about our school, which engages, inspires, and motivates boys while instilling in them characteristics and values we believe every young gentleman should have as they move into adolescence and young adulthood.

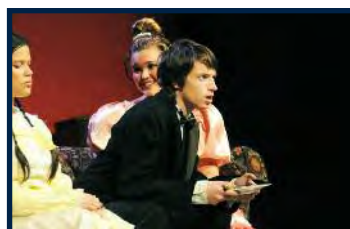

What were your interests at Princeton Academy? Did you play sports?

I certainly played sports at Princeton Academy: soccer in the fall, basketball in the winter, and lacrosse in the spring. My other interests included the violin, student council, and religion.

How did Princeton Academy prepare you for prep school?

Princeton Academy taught me that in any environment and with any opportunity, my enjoyment and the richness of my experience depends entirely on how much I invest myself in what I am doing. More briefly, you get out what you put in. I had a great experience at Princeton Academy because I worked hard to take advantage of every opportunity to learn and grow, and this attitude carried through to high school to give me a very rewarding four years.

What did you learn about Lawrenceville or yourself in the last four years that you didn't expect?

After leaving the Sacred Heart environment, I found it a little strange to be at a school that wasn't specifically Christian. I was drawn to explore my religion independently, joining a student group called the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Until I had to find my own spiritual footing, I didn't realize exactly how much my relationship with God meant to me.

Was it difficult to be a day student among so many boarders?

No, I found I could enjoy the social life of a boarding school and the family life of home at the same time.

How and when did you get involved with water polo and swimming? What appeals to you about it?

I've been swimming for as long as I can remember. I grew up swimming every day in my grandparents' pool in South Africa. I got involved with water polo when I started playing for the Lawrenceville Stingrays water polo club around fifth or sixth grade. I love the sport because of its physicality and creativity. I love that it is physically demanding (imagine wrestling in the water then swimming as fast as you can to the other side over and over again, all without touching the bottom of the pool or the sides). I am a very competitive person, and I really enjoy taking on an opponent and trying to out hustle, outplay, and outmatch their strategy and ability. The water is a unique medium, and it adds a third dimension to the game that you can't find in other sports. I love the challenge of finding creative ways to use the water to my advantage as I play.



Why did you choose Stanford?

I chose Stanford because it offers me the best opportunity to pursue my academic and athletic passions. I was recruited for water polo, and I am tremendously excited to play at the Division I level. I am also very excited to join the vibrant academic community that Stanford is famous for — to learn with the kind of minds that are on the cutting edge of research and entrepreneurialism.

What is your ultimate goal in sports?

I have always dreamed of playing in the Olympics and playing professionally. More immediately, I am hoping to grow and contribute to my new team (Stanford) as best I can, and I would love to win some NCAA championship rings.

What courses and extra-curricular activities do you hope to pursue in college?

I plan to approach college with an open mind, and I will try to take a variety of classes to explore all of my interests. I do not know exactly what I want to study, but I am interested in perhaps a Premed track. I will, of course, be playing water polo. And I hope to get involved with undergraduate research opportunities and also religious life at Stanford too.

Do you have a career in mind?

I plan to explore a variety of interests before deciding on a specific track. I can see myself perhaps pursuing a career in medicine. (I really like the idea of joining the Doctors Without Borders (*Médecins sans frontières*) organization. I could also see myself going into the world of engineering or even languages — the possibilities are endless.

How have you changed from and/or remained the same as the boy you were at Princeton Academy?

I have always been intellectually curious and hard working. That has not changed. I have always loved my sports. Obviously I am older and more independent now than I was at Princeton Academy. I've grown up and learned to take on the world on my own, but I am always grateful for the strong moral grounding I received at Princeton Academy, which helps me keep in mind what is important in life as I explore new challenges and opportunities.

FOURTH GRADE IS PILOTING KHAN ACADEMY!

Khan Academy has helped us to better differentiate instruction for our gentlemen, give them more time to reinforce and master skills, create a stronger bridge between the home and school, and allow for better use of the school day. Any gaps in their learning of mathematical concepts they may have had in the past, are filled. As educators, we are given immediate feedback on areas of concern and are then able to address them quickly.

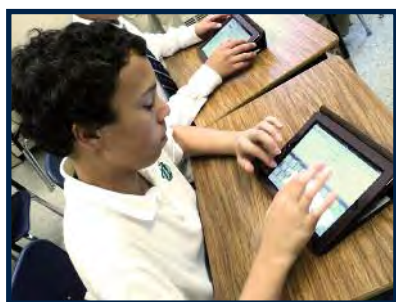
Students can make use of an extensive video library, practice exercises, and assessments from any computer with access to the web. It is a complete custom self-paced learning tool, dynamic system for getting help, and a custom profile, which allows for students to earn points and badges while they measure their progress.

Teachers have unprecedented visibility into what their students are learning and doing on the Khan Academy. They have the ability to see any student's progress in detail, have real-time class reports for all students, and most importantly, have better intelligence for doing targeted interventions.

Students will be assigned one math lesson a night for homework, however, students will also be able to use their classroom iPads and laptops to continue meeting their Khan Academy goals during classroom time as well.



IPad Instructional Program



New and exciting this fall at Princeton Academy is the introduction of iPads to the instructional program at all grade levels. Grades 7 and 8 have a one-to-one program. All other grade levels have iPads available to them to assist in individualized and differentiated instruction, and supplement existing laptop carts. The library also has a set of iPads for use in research and reading. This wonderful enhancement to its instructional technology is made possible this year as a result of generous donations from parents and friends of Princeton Academy at the school's annual spring gala in May 2011. Princeton Academy has been blessed with a supportive and involved community that has contributed significantly to the school's success over the years.

Our Sacred Heart Roots

Princeton Academy's administrative team attended the Sacred Heart Network Conference, "Advancing the Mission: I watch, I listen, I pray." The three-day retreat, sponsored by the Network of Sacred Heart Schools, was held at the Academy of the Sacred Heart in St. Charles, Missouri, June 2011. FROM THE finance committee

Princeton Academy celebrated another successful academic season over the 2010-2011 school year. Our school effectively managed its budget, while maintaining competitive faculty salaries; enhancing our technology efforts and meeting the increasing financial aid demands. We can attribute much of this success to the spirit and passion of our faculty and parent bodies. In addition, the following key accomplishments supported our success:

- Sale of the Hamptons gift real estate property for net proceeds of \$4.88m – this will now get us on the path for the school renovation and improvements termed “The Master Plan Buildout”
- An all-time high Annual Fund campaign of \$275,915
- Record parent participating in our Annual Giving Campaign of nearly 100%
- An Annual Gala that raised \$203,355 and exceeded its high bar of fun goals

While Princeton Academy and all private schools face challenging times, we continue to further develop our school and programs anchored by the Sacred Heart Goals. Thanks to the generosity of so many, and the spirit of community fostered at Princeton Academy, we have been able to remain fiscally strong while making significant improvements to our technology program, providing competitive salaries and benefits for our faculty and staff, and increase the funding available for financial assistance during this time of economic uncertainty. Princeton Academy is not only an inspiring learning community for boys; it is also a community of giving, partnership, volunteerism, and care for others.

Finally, the continuity of your support is very important. If you have not yet contributed financially, or as a volunteer, I encourage you to do so. Ask Olen, a School Trustee, or a faculty member how you can help. With a new year upon us, the enthusiasm among the Princeton Academy students and faculty seems to be back in full swing. Let us join in that enthusiasm, as we continue to support and build a school where values matter, and where boys learn best!

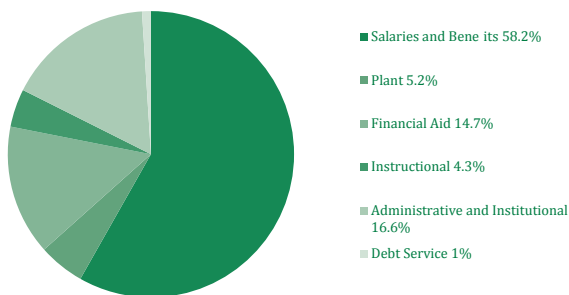

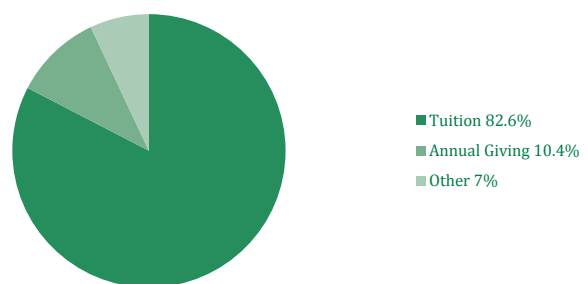

As a charitable contribution, your gift to Princeton Academy of the Sacred Heart is afforded tax benefits according to the type of donation you make. We recommend consulting with your tax advisor to discuss which option can bring you and your family the most lasting satisfaction. Careful planning of your gift to Princeton Academy can help to maximize your contribution to the school, and to realize your personal goals.

Gifts can be made in several ways:

Gifts of Cash qualify for a charitable deduction in the year given, up to a limit of 50 percent of your adjusted gross income.

Matching Gifts are an excellent way to increase the amount of your gift. Check with your employer to see if they offer matching giving to qualified institutions.

Gifts of Appreciated Securities held for more than one year permit a donor to claim the full value of the securities at the time of donation as a tax deduction, while avoiding the capital gains that would be imposed if the securities were sold.

Gifts of Property, including residence, farm, vacation home, jewelry, art, etc., provide significant benefits to the school and to the donor. The specialized help of appraisers and tax advisors is necessary to make such a gift.

Gifts of Life Insurance can provide a way to make a sizable gift at a relatively low cost. Again, consulting with your attorney or tax advisor is important.

Bequests and Life Payment Plans are excellent ways to support the school at levels you might not ordinarily consider. These gifts include a bequest in one's will as well as various trust instruments. Bequests and Life Payment Plans directed to Princeton Academy qualify the donor for membership in The Acorn Legacy Society.

GIFTS TO ENDOWMENT

An endowment is a permanent fund from which only earned income is spent; the principal is invested under the guidance of the Board of Trustees. Funds come to the endowment through gifts designated for that purpose by donors, and through unrestricted capital gifts that the trustees designate for endowment.
